## From the Pastor's Desk S Watch Night

He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor."
-Luke 4:18-19

Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation became law at midnight on January 1st, 1863. In the late hours of New Year's Eve and every New Year's Eve since, African Americans have gathered in churches and other safe places for Watch Night, a celebration of freedom from enslavement. Of course, the good news of emancipation was not an immediate reality for most enslaved people, and freedom remained out of reach for them until 1865.

Advent is a season to watch with anticipation for Christ to enter our existence, and not only once as a poor child lying in a manger but again in the fullness of time to establish God's reign once and for all. God's reign is a reign of freedom; it means good news for the poor, release for the captives, liberation for the oppressed.

In the interim, the time between Jesus' first and last arrival, however, we recognize that true freedom remains out of reach for all those who still suffer persecution on account of one or another aspect of their identity, whose income is insufficient for abundant life, whose struggle for justice and life with dignity continues.

So, like the saints who first celebrated Watch Night in solidarity with those whose chains had yet to be broken, we proclaim release in the name of Christ to all who are still captive in our time. Watching for Christ means watching for the world to turn, that God's dream for freedom might finally be realized.

#### A friend's story of perspective

The woman stepping onto the bus was having a tough time boarding. The bag of groceries in her left arm was precariously tipping, on the verge of spilling its contents into the aisle as she struggled to make her payment. The driver patiently waited, even as my patience turned to total frustration. "Why can't people get their act together??" I thought to myself as the scene dragged on.

Finally. Payment made, she turned towards me, to work her way down the aisle, to find a seat. And as she did, I saw her for the first time. Her face had a look of resigned determination and acceptance. Her hair, with streaks of grey, flowed down across her shoulders. Her arms clutched at the bag of groceries, and, beyond her arms, were...nothing. She had no hands.

My friend, who was sharing this story with me paused and looked at me. "Our eyes met, for the briefest of moments, and she turned and sat down. I dropped my gaze, down to my own two hands. Emotions swept over me in waves. Shame: At my frustration. At my idle observation. I didn't even offer to help. Awe: At her stoic acceptance and willingness to work through each day. And finally, Humble thankfulness. I have two hands."

Two hands to reach out, to hold on to a book, to slice an onion, to rake the leaves, to hold my daughter close to my chest.

Thanksgiving is upon us as I write this with my two hands; advent and the birth of our Savior just around the corner. But today, I thank God for the gifts that I don't even know he has given me. The gift of a new day. The gift of a friend. The gift of two hands.

#### ADVENT IN OUR TIME

The word Advent comes from the Latin adventus and means to come, to arrive, to appear. Over time that word has become one that everybody can understand and appreciate, especially in the context of our celebration and observance during the Christmas season. We now observe and celebrate Advent on the four Sundays and continuing in the weeks before Christmas; therefore, the first day of Advent will probably not occur on the same day each year. In recent times, Advent has taken on ever greater significance. In the context of our business-oriented world, the creativity that manufacturers find for Advent-related books, foods, decorations, etc. has led to the development of sweets, musical creations, such as pyramids and calendars. It is not uncommon to find Advent calendars in our homes today. Perhaps you had one in your home, where children opened a window and where you would find a small piece of chocolate on each of the twenty-four days leading up to Christmas.

This could easily lead us to the conclusion that Advent has become a commercial enterprise. That trend toward commercialization seems to increase exponentially each year with new and unrelenting marketing and creative techniques. Perhaps you may have noticed in the comic strip PEANUTS, how Lucy and Charlie Brown suggest that Advent is part of some eastern conglomerate! An interesting experience would be to visit a German Weihnachtsmarkt (Christmas market); this is where one sees the creativity and ingenuity that accompany the Advent season in the town square. Traditionally that market begins with the Advent season. The irresistible smell of an outdoor Christmas market is not only also tempting, but also thought provoking.

In some cultures Christmas actually begins at the conclusion of Advent. What a contrast to the fact that some stores and shops in our country already have Christmas decorations in place! The four Sundays of Advent have the following names: 1) promise, 2) light, 3) love, 4) hope. In other countries, December 26 is also a holiday. The wreath is green, which represents growth and in reality the symbolism becomes obvious. By definition the wreath is also symbolic; it is round, without beginning and without end. The intent of lighting one additional candle each week is to illustrate that many candles together will provide more light than just one; that procedure then illustrates the growing power of Jesus. Other symbols that are used for Advent, to a varying degree, are moss, the Christmas rose, mistletoe, and at the end of Advent, the Christmas tree is put in place. The position of Advent can be construed as ambivalent, for it is both beginning and ending; in the secular world it is the end of the year (such as "end of year" sales); in the church setting it is a symbol of beginning a new year.

Yet things that are old do not necessarily go out of style; they actually assume ever-growing significance and meaning, and therefore our awareness of and observance of Advent today will take on an importance that will not readily disappear. Our celebration of Advent tonight is evidence that it is indeed a significant part of our Lutheran heritage, and it is our hope that this experience will be interesting and lasting.
