



Holy Baptism: The Great Bath of the Church

"As many of you as were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ. There is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus. And if you belong to Christ, then you are Abraham's offspring, heirs according to the promise." -Galatians 3:27-29

"In Holy Baptism the Triune God delivers us from the forces of evil, puts our sinful self to death, gives us a new birth, adopts us as children, and makes us members of the body of Christ, the Church. Holy Baptism is received by faith alone…. It is done once, yet it is for all of our life." -The Use of the Means of Grace, 1997

A pastor once told the story of new parents who came to his office to discuss baptism for their infant child. "We love being part of the church," they said. "We're just not sure we want to impose this on her. We'd rather wait and let her decide for herself if she wants to be baptized."

The pastor listened intently, all the while noticing that both parents and their child were decked out from head to toe in the crimson and gray of the Ohio State Buckeyes. He nodded his head, and said, "I understand your concern. By the way, do you intend to wait and let your child decide for herself which is her favorite college football team?"

Why Holy Baptism? Daniel Erlander enumerates the multiple reasons for this longstanding ritual, paraphrased here:

1) the need to surround a person with love and promises – God's, the faith community's, the family's;

2) in order to name a person God's child, and not just "mine" or "ours";

- 3) belonging in a community, a people who share a history, a way of life, and a hope for the future;
- 4) in order to celebrate God's forgiving and liberating power over a person's life;
- 5) in order to be shaped by a common story, namely the story of God's love revealed in Jesus Christ;

6) in order that a person bear the name "Christian," and experience the abundant life of dwelling in Christ.


Baptism is a primary means of God's grace in the life of the baptized person, and the classic rite of entry into the great communion of faith. Baptism is also the "visible gospel" for the rest of us to witness and cherish, making our promise in turn to support and care for all who come to the font as fellow children of God and kindred in Christ. Our principal identity, our fundamental dignity, is that of baptized child of God in union with the baptized in every time and place. We are "clothed" with Christ, not in the sense that we "wear" our other identity markers – tribe, class, or gender – but that we might be one in our diversity, together in the promise that nothing can separate us from the love of God in Christ.

UPDATES AND NEWS FROM YOUR CONGREGATIONAL COUNCIL

The council has had a busy year so far. Here are a few highlights from the work of the council.

The council established a Children, Youth, Family, and Intergenerational (CYFI) Ministry task force to take on discerning vision toward the future. If you read Pastor Nate's clarion article in August, attended the parent and family meeting with the task force to talk about the vision last spring or have had a task force member ask you to be a part of the vision moving forward, you are probably starting to see some new ideas forming for CYFI ministry this fall. We know that this new ministry will be a process, a work in progress so to speak, but we are excited about the possibilities for the new and bold ideas we will be experiencing together.

The council has been working on constitutional compliance. You will see some changes in our election process for officers of the council, whom also serve as your officers of the congregation. We will be forming a nominating committee in accordance with our constitution. This committee will secure at least one nomination for each officer position from the elected and continuing 2020 congregational council members. We are also developing audit procedures and working toward forming an audit team to comply with constitutional audit requirements.

The council is working on identifying, organizing, and reviewing current policy. We will be identifying all policies approved by council from January 2014 through the present. We have also established a task force that is currently working on developing policy regarding access to financial giving information. If you have any concerns or thought you would like to share with the task force on this topic, please talk with Paula Schultz.

Your council members serve as representatives of the congregation. If you have thoughts, questions or concerns, feel free to talk with one of your council members.




Men's breakfast is Saturday September 7. I believe I am doing a presentation of some sort. Gentlemen, come join us! Prayer and breakfast at 8:30.

CHURCH, DISCIPLESHIP, AND BEER

I lured them in with the promise of beer. (Saint and sinner, sinner and saint.). The idea was simple. Get a group of guys together, meet once a month, and talk about life, our struggles, and where the heck did God fit into all of this. We called ourselves The Guys in the Garage with God. The rules? 1: We always, well, mostly anyway, met in a garage. 2: We opened in prayer, and promised to pray for each other. 3: We used some sort of reading (bible, or a book) as a springboard to "start the conversation. 4: What was said in the garage, stayed in the garage. Those guys were there for me during the struggles of raising kids and being a husband as a Christian. We were there for each other when we struggled in our faith. We were there for each other as we celebrated each other's victories and blessings. We were, in short, a small group.

What makes meeting as a small group different than just, say, getting together for dinner?, The idea is to create a safe place where around 3-12 people gather in God's Grace to be renewed, healed, and then sent out into the world. Some small groups focus on study or deepening the Faith. This could look like Tuesday bible study, or maybe reading things like "Falling Upward" by Richard Rohr. Some small groups focus more on Fellowship. Maybe a bit like Men's breakfast, or Thursday coffee. They might focus on mission. Think quilters. They might focus on support. Some churches have small groups to help with grief, divorce, or raising kids. (Think Adults with Youngish Children). They might meet at church, or over coffee, or at a dinner party.

So while each small group can look really different, the idea is to create a safe, confidential place where you could gather with fellow Christians in fellowship to explore your faith in some way. They all generally include prayer, some sort of devotional (it could be simple and short) and confidential conversation.

As I look back, I realize that, for me, "The Guys in the Garage with God" left me with a deeper faith and a stronger desire to try to become the disciple and Christian I believe God calls me to be. So, if there is interest, I'd like to explore starting a few more small groups here at Peace Lutheran Church. I don't know that we need to be meeting in garages, but I like the idea of a place where I can think about my faith and explore what it is God is calling me to do. I hope to offer more information sometime in the next month or so. Is this something you might be interested in? What type of small groups would you like to see here? If you currently facilitate or lead a small group, what resources and support do you wish you had? Let's chat during fellowship, or drop me a line at daveekse@gmail.com.

Our denomination, the ELCA, holds a churchwide assembly triennially - to worship, vote on matters of governance and policy, and be church together for the sake of the world. This past week's churchwide assembly was full of important votes and actions, including:

Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton was reelected for a second six-year term on the first ballot.

- A declaration of apology to our siblings of African descent, which was received by the African Descent Lutheran Association with thanks and a call for accountability and living into the words shared.
- Approved resolution declaring the ELCA is a "sanctuary church body," encouraging participation in the ELCA AMMPARO initiative for migrant children, discernment of care for our immigrant neighbors in our context, and the promise of forthcoming resources for this work.
- Approved support for the World Council of Church's *Thursdays in Black*, awareness movement for a world without rape and violence.
- Voted to commemorate June 17 as a day of repentance, in honor and remembrance of the martyrdom of the Emanuel 9.

Approved a declaration for inter-religious commitment, reaffirming ecumenical and interfaith partnerships.

- Approved the recommendations from a strategic taskforce which has been studying how to work toward authentic diversity in our church.
- Approved memorials: affirming but not "endorsing" the Poor People's Campaign, care for immigrants and refugees, and other statements.
- Adopted a new social statement, "Faith, Sexism, and Justice: a Lutheran Call to Action," and its implementing resolutions.
- Deacon Sue Rothmeyer was elected Churchwide Secretary, a full-time position which acts as executive administrator and leader on all constitutional matters and interpretation.
- Constitutional change for Deacons (rostered ministers of word and service) to be ordained, from the previous practice of consecration.
- Celebrated the milestones of 50 years of women's ordination, 40 years since the first woman of color was ordained, and 10 years since full inclusion of LGBTQIA+ clergy.
